Tucson is a university town of outdoor enthusiasts, academics and artists. Located in the southern Sonoran Desert beneath the Catalina Mountains, the city has a varied terrain, streets lined with palm trees, cacti, adobe buildings, and gorgeous vistas. It was also recently designated as the first *UNESCO City of Gastronomy* in the US, in recognition of its mix of Native American, Mexican, and European culinary heritage.

Outdoor Activities:

- <u>Tucson Bike Tours</u> \$50 for a guided city tour
- <u>Saguaro National Park</u> brackets the city on the East and West sides. You can get up-close and personal with saguaro cactus by hiking the 2-mile Mica View Loop, or by driving the 8-mile Cactus Forest Scenic Loop.
- <u>Tumamoc Hill</u> is an ecological reserve with a 1.5-mile trail with spectacular uphill views.
- <u>Tucson Mountain Park</u> offers a variety of activities.
- Tucson Botanical Gardens has been called the "Best Secret Garden in America."
- <u>Mission Garden</u> is a nonprofit 4-acre walled urban garden project showcasing desert-adapted orchards and vegetable beds that represent 4000 years of agriculture.

Arts and Culture:

- <u>University of Arizona Museum of Art</u> has a nice collection of Renaissance paintings and modern representation by Marko Rothko and Jackson Pollock, among others.
- <u>The Center for Creative Photography</u> houses the archives of luminaries such as Ansel Adams and Harry Callahan.
- <u>Tucson Desert Art Museum</u> has a small but resplendent collection of local and regional artwork.
- The Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum displays local natural history as its finest.
- San Xavier del Bac Mission is a restored adobe church built in the 1700s.

Misc Places of Interest:

- <u>The Flandrau Science Center & Planetarium</u> features virtual tours of the solar system, rock and roll light shows, and the U of AZ Mineral Museum with a plethora of desert gems, meteors and space debris.
- <u>The Gaslight Music Hall</u> offers a variety of concerts, comedy, music revues and other entertainment.
- <u>The Mini Time Machine</u> museum of miniatures is an expansive collection of more than 400 fully furnished antique and contemporary doll houses.
- The Gadsden-Pacific Division Toy Train Operating Museum is self-explanatory. Limited hours.

Shopping:

- North 4th Avenue, between East 8th and East 4th Streets, is a cluster of independent boutiques and restaurants.
- Old Town Artisans is a one-block restored adobe building filled with arts & crafts.
- Mercado San Agustin is a modern center of local shop owners that looks like a colonial Spanish estate.

Distillers and Brewers:

- Iron John's Brewing Co. incorporates local flavors of mesquite and prickly pear into its brews
- <u>Pueblo Vida Brewing Co.</u> strives for "quality, uniqueness and repeatability" in their craft beers.
- Borderlands Brewing Co. is located in an historic produce warehouse near 4th Ave.

- <u>Dillinger Brewing Co.</u> is a new brewery serving a wide variety of beer styles, with food trucks parked outside.
- The Independent Distillery produces small batches of gin, vodka, whiskeys and bitters.
- <u>A Party Bike Pub Crawl</u> covers a lot of adult beverage territory in 2 hours as participants pedal around town.

Downtown Restaurants:

- El Charro bills itself as the oldest Mexican restaurant in the US.
- The <u>Welcome Diner</u> is a showcase of mid-century modern design with a farm-to-table sensibility.
- <u>Downtown Kitchen + Cocktails</u> features fare from award-winning chef Janos Wider.
- <u>Tucson Food Tours</u> is a foodie's dream. Why choose?
- <u>Taste of Tucson</u> is guided culinary tour of Downtown.
